RE: DEMOLITION REQUEST OF CONVENTION AND EXPOSITION BUILDING FOR 1966

RE: BUDGET REQUEST

On Monday, January 14, Senate Bill 57 was introduced by Senator Davis, who has called it, "the Convention Building, Legion, and Show Bill," which authorizes our Commissioners to extend their title through June 30, 1966 and provides for an appropriation in connection with the demolition & activities. The final amount of our appropriation request is \$657,000, which does not include any sum for demolishing the building as originally suggested. It was the conclusion of the state officers and others connected with finances that that extra amount of \$75,000 could not be made available and that the Commission had concluded all negotiations with the fair Corporation to obtain a waiver on the demolition ruling.

Our bill was referred to the Senate Appropriations Committee. Senator Davis has requested that Senator Lucas, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, consider our request as one of the first items on the Committee's agenda. It is most imperative that our legislation will be passed through both houses by the time of reentry, as originally hoped. The Commission may have to contract engineers and contractors to begin plans for demolishing before funds are actually available. After our hearing by the Appropriations Com., after the bill has been passed, that we can speculate on the passage of the bill and enter into conditional contracts at that point. While we still hope that we may be able to appropriate to our request, we are concerned about legal, and any effort by the Commissioners to expedite passage of the bill will be appreciated.

We are now applying to the many applicants for host and hostess positions for the 1966 season. COMMISSIONERS WHO KNOW OF APPLICANTS, PARTICULARLY FOR THE COOKING AND SERVING OF FOODS, SHOULD ADVISE THAT THEY CONTACT THE CHIEF, OFFICE FOR ENROLLMENT SHEETS AND APPLICATION FORMS.

IN OUR REVIEW OF ALL OF THE YOUTH PEOPLE WHO WORKED FOR THE FAIR IN 1964, WE FOUND NO UNKNOWN UNKNOWN. (WE FOUND THAT OUR PAY SCALE WAS THE LOWEST ON THE FAIR-FAIR AND IN SOME CASES, WORKED AN INDIVIDUALSHIP ON THE EMPLOYER. (THE INFORMATION WHICH WE OBTAINLY RECEIVED FROM THE WORLD'S FAIR ABOUT SALARY WAS AS FOLLOWS: THE FAIR FAIR AND IT IS TRUE THAT NEW YORK, NEW YORK STATE AND OTHER STATE FAIR EXHIBITORS PAID APPROXIMATELY \$2.00 PER HOUR.)

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Since we do demand exceptional performance from the guards, it is only just that we take steps to bring their pay scales closer in line with comparable positions at the Park. Our proposed method of increasing pay scale is in the form of a "subsidiary completion of work" bonus system. This bonus, which would amount to \$1.00 per hour, would be presented to those who have performed without fault or discipline and to the satisfaction of the Pavilion manager. By using the bonus system we avoid getting into the area of living or travel allowance calculations and also realize an economy by leaving the base pay of \$2.50 per hour and time and a half overtime rate unchanged. The cost will be maximum cost to the Pavilion of \$3,500 (70 employees at \$50) can be covered by our proposed budget.

Since a matter of this sort is subject to Commission approval, we ask that Commissioners inform us if the proposal does not meet with your approval. No negative vote ~~will be interpreted as an affirmative~~ will be interpreted as an affirmative vote.
